The first three novels are part of a trilogy about teenage heroine Katniss Everdeen, and the fourth book is a prequel set 64 years before the original. The novels in the trilogy are The Hunger Games (2008), Catching Fire (2009) and Mockingjay (2010). Each was adapted for film, creating The Hunger Games film series, with the film adaptation of Mockingjay split into two feature films. The first two books in the series were New York Times bestsellers, and Mockingjay topped all US bestseller lists upon publication. When the film adaptation of The Hunger Games was released in 2012,reported more than 26 million copies of The Hunger Games trilogy, including the books tied to the films. The Hunger Games universe is a dystopia set in Panem, a North American country consisting of a thriving Capitol and 13 neighborhoods with varying levels of poverty. Every year, kids from the top 12 districts are drawn to compete in a mandatory televised fight to the death called The Hunger Games. District 13 also suffered, but they led a rebellion against the Capitol and forced it to surrender. Because District 13 specialized in nuclear weapons, the Capitol quickly gave in and agreed to a peace treaty. They agreed that everyone in District 13 would go underground and be bombed above ground to make it look like the Capitol had won. All the novels were well received. In August 2012, the series ranked second, behind only the Harry Potter series, in NPR's "100 Most Popular Young Adult Novels" poll, which asked voters to choose their favorite books for young adults. On August 17, 2012, Amazon declared The Hunger Games Trilogy a bestseller, breaking the previous record of the Harry Potter series. As of 2014 [update] the trilogy has sold over 65 million copies in the US alone (The Hunger Games over 28 million, Catching Fire over 19 million and The Mockingjay over 18 million). The Hunger Games trilogy has been sold in 56 countries in 51 languages.[7] On May 19, 2020, The Ballad of Songbirds and Serpents, a pre-school novel about the beginnings of the Hunger Games, starting a young Coriolanus Snow, was launched on May 19, 2020. The Hunger Games trilogy takes place in an uncertain future in the dystopian post-apocalyptic country of Panem in North America. The country consists of an affluent Rocky Mountain capital[10] surrounded by twelve (originally thirteen) poorer counties at the Capitol. The Capitol is lavishly rich and technologically advanced, but the neighborhoods are mixed with poverty. The narrator and protagonist of the trilogy, Katniss Everdeen, lives in District 12, the poorest district of Panem, located in the Appalachians, where people regularly die of starvation. As punishment for the ancient rebellion against the Capitol (the so-called "Dark Days"), during which District 13 was destroyed, one boy and one girl from each of the twelve remaining districts between the ages of 12 and 18 are chosen by lottery, for participation in the annual annual competition, competition called "Hunger Games". The Games are a televised event in which contestants known as "tributes" are forced to fight to the death in a dangerous public arena. The winner and his home district are then rewarded with food, supplies, and wealth. The purpose of the Hunger Games is to entertain the Capitol and remind the shires of the Capitol's power and lack of remorse or forgiveness for the failed rebellion of the current rivals' ancestors. Structure Each book in the Hunger Games trilogy is divided into three parts with nine chapters each. Collins said the format came from her experience writing drama, which taught her how to write in a three-act structure; her previous series, The Duneon Chronicles, was similarly written. He considers each group of nine chapters to be a separate part of the story, and the commentary continues to refer to these parts as "gaps of the work". Origin Collins says she drew inspiration for the series from both classic and contemporary sources. Its main classical inspiration is the Greek myth of Theseus and the Minotaur, in which, as punishment for past crimes, Minos orders Athens to sacrifice seven youths and seven maidens to the Minotaur, who kills them in a vast labyrinth. Collins says that even as a child she was surprised by the idea because "it rewards are exhausted, policy changes will be canceled abruptly. Since neither wants to kill the other, Katniss comes up with a solution: double suicide by ingesting poison berries. This leads authorities to admit that they both won their matches just in time to save their lives. During and after the games, Katniss' true feelings for Peeta grow, and she tries to reconcile them with the fact that their relationship was forced. Haymitch warns her that the danger is not over yet. The authorities are outraged that they are being made fools of, and the only way to assuage their anger is to continue to pretend that her actions were out of love for Peeta and nothing else. On the way home, Pete is horrified to learn of the scam. Catching Fire Main article: Catching Fire Catching Fire is the second installment in the series, released on September 1, 2009. In Catching Fire, set six months after the conclusion of The Hunger Games, Katniss discovers that her opposition to the film from the previous novel, from the chain reaction that inspired a riot in the neighborhoods. President Snow threatens to hurt Katniss's family and friends if Katniss does not help quell the riot and marry Peeta. Meanwhile, Peeta has realized Katniss' false love for him, but while he is sad, he does not force her in any way. He was also informed of Snow's threat, so he promised to help keep the law in order to spare the people of District 12. KatnissGale Hawthorne's boyfriend confesses his love to Katniss, which shocks and confuses her. Katniss and Peeta march triumphantly across the lands and plan a public wedding. As Katniss and Peeta follow Snow's orders and follow the ruse, they inadvertently start a mutiny, and the fake badge she wears becomes her symbol. The people of Panem begin to organize a rebellion against the Capitol district by district. Snow announces a special 75th Hunger Games - known as the Quarter Quell - in which Katniss and Peeta are forced to compete against other previous winners, effectively canceling the wedding. Katniss believes that Peeta should survive these games instead of her and sacrifices her life to save him. Peeta, in turn, dedicates his life to saving her, and the two recognize the other's conflicting intentions. At Haymitch's insistence, the pair team up with several other tributes and manage to destroy the arena and escape the game. Katniss is rescued by District 13 rebels and learns that Peeta and her District 7 ally Johanna Mason have been captured by the Capitol. Katniss eventually learns - to her surprise - that she just so happened to be an integral part of the rebellion all along. Their rescue was planned jointly by Haymitch, Plutarch Heavensbee and Finnick Odair, among others. When Katniss learns that Peeta has been captured and is now being tortured and killed, she is enraged and loses the will to live. Gale informs them that the Capitol destroyed District 12 in retaliation. After a moment's hesitation, Katniss joins the rebels. Mockingjay Main article: Mockingjay Mockingjay, the third and final book in the Hunger Games series, was released on August 24, 2010. Most of the districts rebelled against the Capitol, led by District 13 and its president, Alma Coin. The Capitol lied about destroying the district in the Dark Days. After a dispute with the Capitol, the residents of District 13 began living underground and rebuilding their home.The survivors of Outpost 12 find shelter there. Katniss also learns that Peeta is alive, being tortured and forced to speak on national television to discourage rebellion. He agrees to become the "Mockingjay", a symbol of rebellion. In return, he demands immunity for Peeta, Johanna Mason, Annie Crest, and Enobaria, the winners of games won by the Capitol. Katniss also claims the privilege of killing President Snow himself. Realizing that the Capitol will continue to torture Peeta as long as he supports the rebellion, Katniss has a panic attack and loses her ability to act as Mockingjay. A rescue mission begins to rescue Peeta, Johanna and Annie. However, Peeta has been brainwashed into killing Katniss and tries to strangle her during their reunion. He undergoes an experimental treatment to try to cure him. With no hope of recovery, Katniss decides to give her all to the rebellion and die in the process. Throughout the novel, Katniss sees how ruthless Gale is. He doesn't seem to value human life as much as she does. It has no sympathy for the insurgency's enemies and is content to torture and murder, even innocent civilians, to support the insurgency. She tries to balance this with the fact that she still cares about Gale. In the midst of her overwhelming loneliness and PTSD, she kisses Gale, but he says the kiss isn't real because it's like kissing someone who is drunk. Katniss, having recovered from Peeta's attack, is tasked with filming propaganda in relatively quiet combat zones with a team called the "Star Squad" consisting of Gale, Peeta, Finnick, a cameraman, and various other soldiers. However, Katniss decides to go to the Capitol to kill Snow, pretending that Coin gave her the task. Peeta still struggles with the brainwashing, but he recovers and still loves Katniss. Most of the team are killed along the way, including the recently married Finnick. HowHe approaches Snow's mansion and sees a group of Capitol children surrounding him like human shields. Suddenly, the hovercraft drops silver parachutes on the children, who reach out to them in the hope that they will bring food. Some parachutes explode and cause carnage. The advancing rebels send medics, including Primrose Everdeen. The other parachutes then explode, killing Primrose as she sees her sister. Later, an injured Katniss also wakes up from her coma to learn that the rebels have won and Snow awaits execution at her hands. When he meets Snow by chance, he claims that it was Coyne who secretly ordered the bombings to take away the support of his remaining followers. This bomb also matches the description of the one Gail helped design, and she ends her friendship with Gail. Coin then asks the surviving winners to vote for the final Hunger Games, featuring the children of high-ranking Capitol officials (including Snow's granddaughter). In order to gain Coyne's trust, Katniss and Haymitch cast the deciding votes in favor of the scheme. However, during Snow's execution, Katniss kills Coyne with a bow. Snow laughs and then dies. Katniss tries to commit suicide, but Peeta stops her and she is arrested. Katniss goes on trial, but the jury finds her mentally ill and is sent home to District 12. Both Katniss's mother and Gale work in other districts. Pete regains his sanity. Katniss moves in with him and they "grow together". After many years, he finally agrees to have children. They have a girl and a boy growing up in a world without The Hunger Games. To deal with her lingering PTSD, Katniss often thinks about every act of kindness she's ever seen. The Ballad of the Songbirds and the Serpents prequel Main article: The Ballad of the Songbirds and the Serpents Takes place 64 years before the events of The Hunger Games in panem. It follows Coriolanus Snow at the age of 18. Collins explained that the book would also come out about 10 years after the end of the war, with the people of Panem trying to get back on their feet and figuring out how to live in a new reality. The book was released on May 19, 2020. Themes The major themes of the novel are distrust of authority (adults and government), class and caste discrimination, resistance, entertainment ethics, and most importantly, the origins and aftermath of war. Social inequality, irresponsible governance and violence against children were also identified as key issues. "In the world of The Hunger Games, the Capitol lives in lavish wealth and consumption. Meanwhile, in the "neighborhoods", millions of people work in dangerous low-wage jobs. When the Capitol revels in abundance, the counties can hardly afford to feed their children." Author Suzanne Collins also mentions "Just War", gladiator fights, and famines. Other issues mentioned were the war on climate change, and the power and illusions of television Others have cited revolution and insurgency as themes."Although it...is aimed at young people, it presents potentially highly subversive ideas of mass revolution, economic sabotage, and populist struggle against the oligarchy," most notably the compelling quality, particularly of the first book[21] and the action film[22]. John Green of the New York Times compared The Hunger Games to Scott Westerfeld's Freaks. Catching Fire was praised for improving the first book. "The Mockingjay" was acclaimed for its portrayal of violence, peacemaking, and romantic intrigue.The Seri e has been criticized as the reality show's "game of death" theme was a derivative of previous works, notably Battle Royale as well as The Run.The Long Walk[21] Sacrifice 10[28] and Episode 7: The Pretenders[29]. The series has also been criticized for its romance, with Rollie Welch of Ohio's The Plain Dealer criticizing the characters' lack of decisive demeanor. [30] while Jennifer Reese of Entertainment Weekly said there was little separation between Peeta and Gal and that the series was lacking "erotic energy" seen in the Twilight series.[31]J.C. In his review, Mike Ruiz claims that The Hunger Games lacks the first-person narrative of the original novel. As a result, Ruiz claims the novel is better than the film.[33] The last book, Mockingjay, was criticized by SF website Dan Shade, who felt Katniss was a weaker character than her companions and less committed to the journey to the Capitol, and given her revenge on President Snow, her actions went in the finale in contrast, its established character.[34] On November 5, 2019, BBC News included The Hunger Games in its list of the 100 most influential novels.[35] Adaptions Film adaptations Main article: The Hunger Games (film series) Lionsgate Entertainment has acquired worldwide distribution rights to an adaptation of The Hunger Games to be produced by Nina Jacobson's Color Force production company.[36] Collins filmed the novel himself[36] with director Gary Ross[37]. The cast included Jennifer Lawrence as Katniss, Josh Hutcherson as Peeta, and Liam Hemsworth as Gale. The first film began production in spring 2011[41] and was released in March 2012.[42][43] Catching Fire replaced Ross as director with Francis Lawrence. [44] [45] [46] The film was released in November 2013. Lawrence then directed Mockingjay Parts 1 and 2, [47] publishedNovember 2014 and 2015 A film version of the prequel directed by Francis Lawrence is in development.
