Abiah m Biblical is a variant of Abijah, similarly borne by both males and females in the Old Testament. Abiram m Biblical Means "my father is exalted" in Hebrew, derived from אָבִי ('av) meaning "father" and רָם (rum) meaning "to exalt".
