I heard about Enoch's book for the first time ago, while I was looking for 'end of days' prophecies. When I finally managed to get a copy, I discovered that it was a very strange and unusual book. The first time I read it I was skeptical and a bit confused; I was wondering who would write a strange book like this. I knew that Enoch, (Hanokh in Hebrew), was very favorably mentioned in Jewish, and I discovered that Enoch's book describes the exodus and Moses very favorably (although not by name). So my first theory was that it could have been written around the same time as the Torah, perhaps around 1400 A.C. However, after several readings, I can't find theories.
