In Iraq, aid worker Margaret Hassan is kidnapped, while Japan experiences devastating earthquakes and Arsenal Football Club suffers a rare defeat. Cuba's Fidel Castro announces an end to US dollar transactions, Al Jazeera broadcasts a video from Osama bin Laden admitting responsibility for the 9/11 attacks. November 6th sees a train crash in England, claiming seven lives, as Iraq's interim government declares a state of emergency. The US invades Fallujah and Saddam Hussein remains at large. In New Zealand, the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior is dedicated, while Yasser Arafat dies under mysterious circumstances. Palestine's PLO confirms his death, with Mahmoud Abbas taking charge minutes later. Dominica faces its worst earthquake in history, displacing thousands. The Orange Revolution begins in Ukraine, sparked by disputed presidential elections. In Georgia, a new cathedral is consecrated, and China experiences a deadly school massacre. Pope John Paul II returns relics to the Eastern Orthodox Church, while Indonesia's Lion Air Flight 538 crashes, killing 28 people. December 5th sees the UK introduce civil partnerships, and the Cuzco Declaration establishes South America's Community of Nations. The Millau Viaduct is inaugurated in France, but a gang of thieves steals £26.5 million from a Northern Bank branch. Iraq suffers its deadliest suicide attack on US soldiers, while Sri Lanka and other countries face devastation from the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami.
