Given article text here The fourth volume of A Song of Ice and Fire, *A Feast for Crows*, marks a significant departure from George R.R. Martin's initial plans, which involved a five-year narrative gap between *A Storm of Swords* and *A Dance with Dragons*. However, due to creative challenges and the need to fill in the gaps in the story, Martin decided to write *A Feast for Crows* instead. The novel primarily focuses on the perspectives of major characters such as Sansa and Arya Stark. Sam Tarly, Brienne of Tarth, Cersei and Jaime Lannister. In contrast, Jon Snow, Tyrion Lannister, and Daenerys Targaryen's storylines were moved to *A Dance with Dragons*. Despite its complexities and timeline issues, *A Feast for Crows* remains well-written, with Martin excelling in character development, worldbuilding, and political intrigue. The novel introduces new perspectives, such as Cersei and Brienne's viewpoints, while also exploring the aftermath of the grand conflict in the first three books. While it's understandable to question the impact of minor decisions in previous books on the larger narrative, George R. R. Martin's approach can be frustrating for readers who crave fast-paced action. However, *A Feast for Crows* is more than just a setup book, with intricate plot threads and character developments that are essential to the story. The only aspect that feels overly detailed is Brienne's journey through the riverlands, which might be better suited for a slower reveal in future books. Additionally, some readers may find Cersei's backstory, particularly her childhood prophecies, to be somewhat unconvincing at first glance. Despite this, *A Feast for Crows* is well-written and engaging, even if it's more measured in its pace compared to the previous books. The *A Song of Ice and Fire* fantasy series by George R.R. Martin released its fifth instalment in 2005, titled "A Feast for Crows". With Tywin Lannister deceased, Cersei takes control as regent for her son Tommen, but it seems she may not be as well-equipped to handle the responsibilities as she thought. Meanwhile, Brienne of Tarth is searching for Sansa Stark in the Riverlands, who has assumed a new identity and is living safely in the Vale of Arryn. In the Iron Islands, a power struggle emerges following Balon Greyjoy's passing, leading to tension between his potential successors. In Dorne, Princess Myrcella Baratheon is caught up in a plot for revenge by a rebellious princess. Samwell Tarly travels to Oldtown to become a maester at Jon Snow's behest, while Arya Stark begins her training as a Faceless Man in Braavos. The novel features 12 distinct narrative voices, some of whom are notable absentees from previous books. "A Feast for Crows" is set in parallel with its sequel, focusing on the southern six kingdoms and Westeros, while the next instalment handles events north of the Narrow Sea. The story is told through various perspectives: Cersei Lannister, primarily; Jaime and Brienne in the Riverlands; Sansa's viewpoint from the Vale of Arryn; Balon's brothers and daughter in the Iron Islands; Aroo Hotah, Arys Oakheart, and Arianne Martell in Dorne; Samwell Tarly on his journey to Oldtown; and Arya Stark in Braavos. Elements from "A Feast for Crows" were adapted into Seasons 4, 5, and 6 of the HBO series *Game of Thrones*. The book is rife with references to various tropes, including a subverted "Child Shall Lead Them", as eight-year-old Tommen serves more as a puppet king under Cersei's control rather than actual ruler; the Citadel becomes an example of an Academy of Adventure deconstructed, where Sam must be cautious not to reveal his true intentions. Brienne meets three boys who try to sell her food: one offers clams, one crabs, and one offers her his sister. The scene is reminiscent of a similar encounter in "The Hedge Knight". Brienne Repaints Her Sigil
Brienne commissions a woman to repaint her sigil with an elm tree and shooting star on a field of sunset clouds. Cersei's Puppet Show Punished
A half-crazed member of the royal family, Cersei, construes a puppet show as a veiled insult to the crown. The performers are punished in response. Thoros Brings Catelyn Back
Catelyn Stark is resurrected several days after death, but not before becoming a partially rotted and vengeance-fueled revenant of her former self. Ser Robert Strong's True Form It is strongly implied that Ser Robert Strong is the reanimated corpse of Gregor Clegane, fueled by Qyburn's twisted experiments. The massive knight seems to never sleep or eat, and likely has no head under his greathelm. Doran Hides Arianne's Past
Doran keeps Arianne in the dark about her true identity, fearing she would reveal it to others. Brienne Refuses Nimble Dick's Proposal
Nimble Dick suggests sharing a bed to save money while traveling with Brienne. She refuses, citing that she could lay her sword between them for safety. Sansa Meets Lady Myranda Royce
Sansa meets the widowed Lady Myranda Royce, who shares a harrowing experience of having died in childbirth. - Guardsmen who wed their axes upon graduation say that Aroo Hotah sleeps with him by his side and calls it his "ash-and-iron wife". - Jaime struggles with conflicting loyalties between his family and vows, but finds it easier after Brienne's example of knightly virtue. - Arianne was devoted to her father at 14 and would often visit him; she later planned to overthrow him but wanted Doran to live in comfort. - Jaime remembers a conversation about Prince Rhaegar's plans for Westeros before he died. - Gerold Dayne and Princess Arianne have a witty exchange about Ser Arys Oakheart. - House Stark is demoted from the series, with few members featured as POV characters. - Littlefinger had hoped to wait 4 or 5 quiet years but things are moving too fast. - Cersei's decisions often backfire due to rushing into actions. Cersei's attempt to resolve Iron Throne's debt by negotiating with the Faith of Seven has severe consequences when she overlooks the potential dangers of re-arming a fanatical force with a history of violence against the monarch. When Margarya is imprisoned, Cersei's tantrum backfires as she's subjected to harsh treatment and humiliation. In contrast, Cersei views bounty hunters who failed her as deserving punishment for wasting her time, rather than their actual crimes. The novel also explores themes of power abuse, with Kevan expressing outrage over Cersei using her position to seduce a much younger Lancel. The story delves into the consequences of such actions, as seen in Falia's revenge against the Greyjoy invaders who humiliated her and her family. Meanwhile, Jaime's attempts to help Cersei are met with rejection, and she instead focuses on Osmund Kettleback while mocking Jaime for his physical disability. When Jaime offers assistance after her arrest, Cersei sends a raven but later orders it burnt, showing her growing isolation. The narrative also highlights instances of dramatic irony, such as the Sand Snakes' desire to kill Tywin without realizing Tyron has already taken care of that. The Blackfish declines Jaime's offer of joining the watch, citing his mistrust of Jon and potential schemes with the Lannisters. Lastly, the story touches on the theme of the lasting impact of war on smallfolk, who live in constant fear of torture and rape. The narrative also references Lady Stoneheart as a symbol of dread, and Cersei's childhood behavior serves as an example of her disregard for human life, mirroring Joffrey's cruel nature. The aftermath of Loras's assault on Dragonstone sets off a chain reaction of events in *A Feast for Crows*. With many powerful figures dead, villains like King Euron Greyjoy take advantage of the power vacuum to further their own ambitions. Cersei rules through her son, while other characters plot and scheme. The novel also explores themes of authority, women's roles in society, through the Ironborn's perspective on this topic, as well as themes of Dorne and the wider story. Balon Greyjoy's decision to name Asha as his heir was met with skepticism by his brother Euron, who seized the throne after Balon's mysterious death. Aeron, a conservative priest, shared Euron's concerns and called for a Kingsmoot instead of Asha taking the throne. Meanwhile, Cersei Lannister struggled with the pressures of being Queen Regent, as her authority came from her children's claim rather than her own right. She faced numerous challenges and ultimately realized how powerless she was when the High Septon imprisoned her on charges of adultery. Arianne Martell also dealt with anxiety about losing her claim to the throne, fearing that her father Doran intended to hand it over to her younger brother Quentyn. However, it turned out that Doran had a different plan in mind - making Arianne queen by marrying Viserys or having Quentyn marry Daenerys. Brienne's chapters explored her feelings of guilt and inadequacy as an Action Girl and the only surviving child of Lord Tarth. She struggled with the consequences of defying tradition and becoming a warrior instead of a traditional lady. Cersei's own actions led to her downfall, as she had Margarya Tyrell arrested for adultery but was later caught in a similar situation when her knight was tortured into confessing to sleeping with her. Her insistence on Margery having a Trial by Combat championed by a member of the Kingsguard also backfired. Arys Oakheart's actions ultimately led to his death, and Arianne suspected that it may have been a form of Suicide by Cop. Lord Rodrik counseled Asha not to attend the kingsmoot, stating that her father had more courage than sense. Cersei's desperation was evident when she told Pycelle to inform the Master of Coin that "he does not have my leave to die" upon hearing about Lord Gyle's worsening condition. A Tyroshi merchant attempted to capitalize on Cersei's offer by coming up with absurd excuses for why Tyrion's head would be better than wanted Doran to live in comfort. - Jaime remembers a conversation about Prince Rhaegar's plans for Westeros before he died. - Gerold Dayne and Princess Arianne have a witty exchange about Ser Arys Oakheart. - House Stark is demoted from the series, with few members featured as POV characters. - Littlefinger had hoped to be chronic rather than sudden, making his eventual demise all the more poignant. Meanwhile, Arya Stark's journey as a Faceless Assassin requires her to surrender all aspects of her identity. Her encounters with the Plague faces serve as a stark reminder of the cost of this transformation. In contrast, Brienne's quest to protect Sansa Stark is driven by a sense of duty and loyalty. On the other hand, Cersei uses Tommen's whipping boy, Pate, as a tool for maintaining control over her son, demonstrating the darker aspects of her leadership style. The Sparrows' interrogation methods are more nuanced than initially presented, as seen with Osney Kettleblack, who is subjected to torture to extract false confessions. However, in contrast, the Blue Bard and Marillion are not coerced into admitting to their crimes but rather broken by the torture to confess to anything. Brynden "Blackfish" Tully's harsh words towards Jaime Lannister have merit, given his vast resources and strategic position at Riverrun. His refusal to trust Jaime is well-founded, especially considering the Red Wedding. The Brotherhood Without Banners, under Lady Stoneheart's leadership, takes a brutal approach to dispensing justice by targeting Freys for their association with the Red Wedding, regardless of guilt or innocence. The new system is even more unjust than anything that has come before it. Cat of the Canals, also known as Arya Stark, encounters a Night's Watch deserter in Braavos, where she leads him into a dark alley and cuts his throat, following her culture's tradition of executing deserters from that organization. This echoes what her father did at the beginning of *A Game of Thrones*. Klingon Scientists Get No Respect: Rodrik "The Reader" Harlaw is an Ironborn scholar who gets minimal respect, much like one might expect. This might be why Asha considers him her favorite uncle since she also doesn't conform to Ironborn gender roles. Leeroy Jenkins: Ser Arys dies unexpectedly when he charges Aroo Hotah's troops, possibly as a deliberate attempt to die honorably and make amends for his dalliances with Arianne. Unwilling to wait for a successful sapping operation, Ser Loras leads a direct charge that takes Dragonstone but costs a thousand lives. Locked in the Dungeon: Margarya and later Cersei are locked away by the Faith Militant. Lower-Deck Episode: Aside from Sansa and Arya's chapters, there are no POV characters from the first book. The focus is on smallfolk and their experiences during the War of the Five Kings. Maybe Magic, Maybe Mundane: Jaime has a vision where he stands vigil over his father's corpse again but is confronted by his mother. He tries to dismiss it as just a dream, but his mother actually responds, pointing out that he still doesn't have his right hand in real life, unlike in the dream. Mistaken for Incest: Cersei observes Margarya and Ser Loras getting along well and starts wondering if they're engaging in an illicit relationship. It's hinted that this is just a projection on Cersei's part due to her own feelings towards her brother Jaime. Mistreatment-Induced Betrayal: Jaime refuses to help Cersei after she's been arrested by the Faith Militant, partly because of her constant belittling and insulting him over the years, as well as revelations about what she did while he was imprisoned at Riverrun. By Cersei, she swiftly strips her cronies of power after being arrested and imprisoned by the Faith Militant. She then offers the regency to Kevan Lannister to fix the mess created under her incompetent rule. Meanwhile, Sam provides Jon with a briefing on the Night Watch's records regarding the Others and potential defeat strategies in his first chapter. The Elder Brother shares the history of the Quiet Isle with Brienne and Pod, while Daven Lannister updates Jaime on the progress of the Riverrun siege and Frey internal tensions. Genna Lannister Frey is then introduced to share stories about the previous generation of Lannisters. Arianne's plan leads to her friends' imprisonment. Myrcella's permanent disfigurement, and Arys Oakheart's death. Jaime discusses the disappearance of young Tyrek Lannister during a riot in King's Landing, questioning if Varys orchestrated the event to cover his capture. Cersei is horrified by Qyburn's torture methods but blames Margarya for her son's adultery confession. Aeron Damphair organizes a Kingsmoot to reject Euron as the Iron Islands' king and supports Victarion's claim, only for Euron's convincing speech to secure his position as king. Cersei recalls a bounty hunter mistakenly delivering the head of an ugly child instead of Tyrion's. Brienne has a moment where she is captured by the Brotherhood Without Banners, claiming Jaime instructed her to protect the Stark girls, but her captors don't believe her. Euron is openly evil, and even the Ironborn consider him so due to his actions. The Loras-led attack on Dragonstone takes place offscreen. Pycelle becomes the only sane man, desperately trying to stop Cersei's disastrous schemes, such as warning her against defaulting on debts to the Iron Bank of Braavos, which could make powerful enemies. Cersei's grip on power proves tenuous as her policies collapse Westeros into economic ruin and her own men turn against her. Meanwhile, a children's charity in King's Landing takes on new significance, while Jaime offers kindness to Robb Stark's widow. When brought before her father, Arianne's pleas for mercy are met with restraint due to the influence of her co-conspirators' families. Cersei's authority is undermined by those close to her, including her own sons Tommen and Jaime, who are manipulated by the Tyrells into a puppet regime. The once-mighty Faith Militant crumbles under Cersei's leadership, their private army transformed into fanatical zealots without respect for her rule. In contrast, Prince Doran chooses restraint in Dorne, refusing to plunge the region into war despite strong sentiment against the Lannisters and Tyrells. He instead seeks to forge alliances behind the scenes, driven by a desire to protect his family's interests following the killing of Oberyn Martell by the Mountain. Given text content here Dorne's fate hangs in the balance as one individual harbors a secret desire to supplant her brother Quentyn as the heir. Unbeknownst to her, her father Doran Martell has been orchestrating an alliance with the remaining Targaryens in search of revenge for his late daughter Elia's murder. A closer examination reveals Brienne's quest to find Sansa is misguided, as she assumes Sansa would have fled to the Vale due to Lysa's influence. However, it is actually a result of Littlefinger's manipulations that propels Sansa towards this location. In Cersei's innermost thoughts, we witness her growing detachment from reality and paranoia-driven schemes. Her fixation on the Tyrells stems largely from their involvement in the death of her son, though her true intentions are rooted in desperation rather than calculated revenge. Contrary to appearances, Tyrion's motivations for his actions against Cersei are not driven by a desire for her demise but rather retribution for past transgressions. The dynamics between Cersei and Tyrion serve as a counterpoint to their public facade. Doran Martell's cautious approach to politics is symbolized by the overripe blood oranges in his Water Gardens, foreshadowing his eventual downfall due to his own indecisiveness. Cersei's mental state deteriorates further with an intimate glimpse into her psyche, where grief and anger converge. Meanwhile, Brienne is disheartened by Ser Quincy Cox's ineptitude in responding to the Saltpans' attack. Aurne Waters exploits Cersei's imprisonment by stealing the Royal Fleet and establishing himself as a pirate king. Arianne's failed attempt to crown Myrcella serves as a reminder of her own vulnerability. In the realm of war veterans, Septon Meribald's poignant speech highlights the psychological toll on those who have witnessed unimaginable atrocities. These "broken men" are forever scarred by their experiences and struggle to find solace in a shattered world. the living are struggling to survive because of the wars, many people are going hungry and don't know how to get back home, their lord doesn't even know their names yet these soldiers break under pressure and live only for day to day survival and no longer as men, meanwhile their lord orders them into battle without caring about the consequences, shouting at them to fight with whatever they have, it's a tragic sight to see once strong warriors reduced to mere animals who survive by any means necessary The boy's excitement got the better of him, causing him to ejaculate on Tyene's hands as soon as she undid his pants. This incident would have likely led to them losing their virginity together had it not been for this sudden outburst. In a flashback, Lord Tyrek intervenes in a game where his knights were betting on who could beat Brienne first, but this doesn't mean he approves of her career choice - he simply believes that women should stick to their traditional roles. The Faceless Men tell Arya that while some women have managed to learn their ways and join their organization, they mostly prefer male members because it's generally considered a woman's place to bear children. Arianne gains Arys Oakheart's support by claiming Anders Frownwood is questioning her fitness to rule and encouraging Quentyn to overthrow her claim to Dorne's throne. Cersei becomes a POV character, revealing beneath her calm exterior she's barely holding it together due to paranoia, megalomania, and insecurity. Daven Lannister suggests that breaking the siege of Riverrun might require a violent storming of the castle against Stannis' loyalists. Loras leads an assault on Dragonstone within a fortnight but suffers heavy losses, potentially including his own life. Septon Meribald notes that was often leave soldiers stranded and lost, leading to banditry as they try to survive by preying on others like themselves. Jon secretly swaps Dalia's baby with Gilly's, sending the former south with Gilly to avoid Melisandre's wrath. Once in power, Cersei continues to play games of intrigue instead of governing, ultimately overextending herself and facing a downfall. Ser Arys Oakheart gets only one POV chapter before being killed off. The Blackfish openly expresses his contempt for the Kingslayer. Cersei receives a harsh dressing-down from Kevan, calling her a poor ruler and mother, and refusing her offer to become Hand of the King without becoming regent. He also tells her he believes the incest accusations against her and Jaime. She learns from Ned Stark that he has hundreds of knights under his command and can summon even more, along with freeriders, warning her that it would be unwise to make him an enemy, though Cersei inwardly views him as a traitor throughout the conversation. Asha decides to take a different path after Rodrik advises her against attending the kingsmoot, implying she cannot accept either her uncles succeeding her father or the Iron Islands being subjugated to the Seven Kingdoms. At the kingsmoot, Victarion vows to continue the war against the northmen to victory, but Asha mocks him by presenting shells and sand from his conquered beaches as treasure and instead proposes a peace deal with one of her noble captives. Euron suggests that the Ironborn can achieve both peace and victory under his rule and is chosen as the islanders' new king. Cersei attempts to take others down with her when she is arrested by the Faith and faces certain death, trying to summon Jaime as her champion so he will either save her or die with her, but he refuses. Brienne is unhappy when Ser Hyle joins her quest, and Arya undergoes temporary blindness as part of her training with the Faceless Men to strengthen her other skills. Rhaegar's promise that changes will be made in Westeros after his return from battle is ironic, given his subsequent death and the fate of his family. Jaime reflects on how Rhaegar was right that changes would occur, but they were not what he had envisioned, and he catches himself thinking similarly when his uncle Kevan departs King's Landing, knowing about his relationship with Cersei. The idea that some characters are too important to walk is subverted when old Erik Ironmaker is carried forward on a driftwood chair by his grandsons, only to be undone when he is forced to reveal his inability to walk due to age and weight. Meanwhile, Cersei's character undergoes a decline as her grief, anger, paranoia, and pride lead to her own downfall, transforming from a ruthless and competent chessmaster into a less effective villain. The straightest example yet of Cersei's character has emerged, with a significant portion of the book dedicated to her. She possesses more chapters than any other character and lacks remorse, unlike Theon and Jaime. In contrast, witnessing her perspective makes her less sympathetic. Notably, her treatment of her children, including Jaime, is portrayed as utilitarian rather than emotionally driven. The primary theme of this book focuses on the devastating consequences of medieval warfare on civilian life, with scenes like Septon Meribald's speech on the Quiet Isle and Thoros of Myr's lament highlighting the horrors of war. The title reflects the scene where carrion birds feast on corpses on a battlefield. In the Wham Episode, Cersei is arrested by the Faith, while Brienne encounters Lady Stoneheart, who demands her execution for treason. Jaime refuses to serve as Cersei's champion, and Doran and Oberyn Martell seek revenge for their sister's death. Arianne's secret betrothal to Viserys Targaryen is also revealed. The book's climax features a poignant conversation between Arianne and Doran, where he reveals that her fiancé was killed by molten gold. The phrase "Vengeance. Justice. Fire and Blood" is used in response to Cersei's demands. Jaime's refusal to become Cersei's champion leads to a dramatic confrontation. In another scene, Gerold Dayne tries to kill Arianne, but she survives with severe injuries. The aftermath of the assassination attempt reveals that her horse intervened, saving her life but leaving her permanently disfigured. Doran comforts Arianne, calling her his ward and expressing regret for her situation. Cersei's plan to send Loras Tyrell to take Dragonstone is also discussed. He will either die trying to capture it, or she would have still achieved her goal, making it a double victory for both parties. However, Cersei fails to anticipate how this triumph will boost the reputation of House Tyrell, putting them in a strong position to challenge her authority at court.
