Windows storage system. Make sure your phone is connected as a media player or using something called MTP. In the AutoPlay dialog box on your computer, select Windows Media Player. If the Play dialog box does not appear automatically, start Windows Media Player. Make sure you see the sync list on your computer. Click the Sync tab or the Sync button on the toolbar to view the sync list. Your phone should appear in the list, similar to the picture. Drag the music you want to transfer to your phone into the sync area. The picture shows the list of songs in the sync list. Drag an album or a single track to the sync list to add more. Drag and drop an album to set all of its tracks for transfer. Click Start Sync to transfer music from your computer to your Android phone. The Start Sync button can be at the top of the list, as shown in the image, or at the bottom of the list. When the transfer is complete, close Windows Media Player. Or leave it open - whatever. Disconnect the phone from the USB cable. You can also disconnect the USB cable from the computer. If you need more information about connecting your phone to your computer. The steps to sync music with other media jukebox programs work similarly to the steps just outlined. iTunes cannot be used to sync music to Android phones. Some phones can copy music from your computer to your phone, but you can't find it. This is because you cannot play copied music on multiple phones. In this case, only music purchased online can be played on the device. You can only have so much music on your phone! Don't be too zealous when copying melodies. In Windows Media Player, the capacity thermometer shows how much storage space is being used and how much is available on your phone. Pay attention to the ad! Indicator!
