In 2001, UK music artist Lulu recorded the song for her album Together with a duet with Irish pop band Westlife and performed it live subsequently. Retrieved December 10, 2018. In 2000, keyboardist Bob Baldwin released a cover of the song from the album BobBaldwin.com.[35][36] Also in 2000, Jamaican reggae and dancehall singer Sanchez recorded a reggae cover version of the song over the "Fi Wi Rock" rhythm produced by King Jammy which became a popular dancehall hit in Jamaica and the US. Released in October 1999 (two months after McKnight's version), Wills' cover peaked at number two on the Billboard country singles charts for a week behind "My Best Friend" by Tim McGraw.[30] Despite not reaching the top spot in the US, the song did manage to reach number one on the Canadian RPM country tracks. February 28, 2000.
