Using Adobe Photoshop, it's very easy to digitally change images and post-processing to create the desired look when you take, or seeing, the image. The program was released for the first time in 1990 by Adobe Systems and is the market leader for image manipulation, starting from 2010. There are many techniques within Photoshop to realize what you want and change the Line color can be relatively simple if done correctly. Find the image you want to change and right-click on it. Choose: "Open with> Adobe Photoshop." This can also be realized before opening photoshop, choosing: "File> Open" and browsing the image. Make sure the image is in RGB color mode using the command: "Image> mode> RGB color." Create a new level on the level you want to modify and fill this level with the color you want for the lines. Find the Pulldown: Layer Palette Blending and select: "Sleenten> Screen> Linear Dodge." The image should take the previously selected color. Once you reached what you were looking for using a level or more layers if they were needed more colors, flatten the image below: "Layer> Flatten image" and then save. When applying a model to the enlarged image, you combine the colors of the image with the design of the model to create the illusion of the texture. However, you can place a template on other layers or on a white canvas, viewing the color of the model in your finished product. To change this color, you can apply a colored filter to an existing scheme. Create a new blank file in Photoshop. Right-click the clone stamp icon in the toolbox and click "Template Template Tool" to switch to the template stamp tool. Click on a reason from the drop-down box in the Options toolbar. My mine are gray, but I always thought that Brown would be suitable. Of course, you could go and buy colored contacts, but it's much easier to use only. Photoshop's "Color" button is your favorite free image editor like Gimp ... to change the color of the eyes. I'm going to show the Technique Using Photoshop So, if you are using a different app, you need to identify the most appropriate equivalent instruments. The instructions should work in many image editing programs. Open the image you want to use in Photoshop. This is the image I'm working with. To get started, create a new blank layer with Blend mode set to color...the keyboard shortcut is Control+Shift+N for PC users, Command+Shift+N for Mac users. Then, in the "Mode" drop-down menu, choose "Color". Double-click the foreground sample and set it to a wild color like light blue in the image below. Go to Edit > Fill and select Foreground Color to fill the blank layer with this color...You can also use the keyboard shortcut Alt+Backspace (on Windows) or Option+Delete (on Mac). Everything in your image will now look like a strange shade of blue. This will help you choose your eyes. Add a black layer mask to the color layer by holding down Option or Alt and clicking the New layer mask button. Remember, with a mask, white reveals and black hides. Enlarge the subjects' eyes (Control+ on Windows, Command+ on Mac) and select the Brush tool by pressing B on the keyboard. Select the Soft Round bushing from the Brush menu, set Opacity to 100%, and Flow to about 60%. Reset the color samples to their default values of black and white by pressing the D key, then replace them to have white as the foreground color by pressing X. Select the layer mask and start painting white over the eyes. This will show the color level. Be careful with the iris and avoid the pupil until you have a good mask. Repeat the procedure for the other eye. (You may need to change the size of the brush to fit certain areas, depending on the photo.) The mask probably looks a little painted, so go to Filter > Blur > Gaussian Blur and add about 2 pixels of blur to the mask. This will ease the transitions. Now that you have a good mask for both eyes, it is time to color them in a more natural shade. Select the color level, then double-click the foreground color sample. With some experiments, I found that the following values are a good starting point when changing someone's eye color: For blue eyes, set H to 210, S to 7, and B to 70. For grey eyes, set H to 210, S to 3 and B to 70. For green eyes, set H to 100, S to 4, and B to 80. For brown eyes, set H to 40, S to 25 and B to 15. Compose the color you want to use and press OK. Go to Edit > Fill in and select Foreground Color to change the subject's eyes. Depending on the color of the subject's eyes, you will also need to light up or darken the iris to make things happen. Rebecca, the model in the photo I'm using, has dark brown eyes, so they have to be lit a little bit. For my lighter gray eyes, I often have to darken things. Add a Curve Adjustment Level to the image. It is the best way to adjust brightness in Photoshop. You've already done a big level mask, so it doesn't make sense. I mean.Again. Hold down Option or Alt and drag the layer mask from the Color layer to the Curve layer. Now the curves will only affect the eyes. Select a point on the curve and drag upwards to illuminate the eyes or downwards to darken them if necessary. The values I have suggested in this article are just a starting point. Each image is unique. While most of the time the colors I recommend should give you a natural eye color, if they don't seem right, touch up the color and curvature levels until they do. Changing your eye color, or that of a friend, in Photoshop is a lot of fun. Everyone wants to know what they'd look like with blue or green eyes. You don't have to limit yourself to the natural color of the eyes, or the same technique can be used to make the eyes yellow like wolves or the eyes purple Targaryen. Hold down Shift and click on the background areas you want to replace.Existing Image Replace: With the background selected, use the Fill tool to apply a new color from the color palette. Changing the background color of an image having a dramatic effect on its appearance, and one of the best tools to do so is adobe photoshop, although there are some excellent alternatives. that you have the full version or a free trial version, there are some different methods that you can oare fortl's so. Change the background in Photoshop Before creating a new image is the fastest way to set your preference. When making a new document in Photoshop, there will be an option to choose the background color. Use your drop-down menu or color-select box to choose the color you prefer the background to be. When creating a new image, you will have your choice as its background color. In Photoshop CC 2018 and more recent this option will be in the lower right corner of the new document window. In the oldest versions of Photoshop, it is located at the bottom of the window. To change the background color after creating the image, you can create a new background in a color of your choice: select the Layers tab at the top of the window. Select New Fill Level, then select Solid Color à € "unless you particularly want a gradient or pattern background. Give the new layer a name, then select OK when prompted. Select a color from the palette and select OK again. Before you can change the background color in Photoshop you need to select it. Here are some ways to do it, if you are working on Windows or MacOS: the Magic Wand tool is quick and dirty and works better when there are stark differences between the first floor and the background, but it can work pretty well if you are short in time or patience. To do this, select the Magic Wand tool from the menu to the left (it's the fourth down and looks like a wand). Then press and select Shift and select the different parts of the background you want to change the color of. If the magic wand is a bit too heavy or not faded enough to select all your background, the lapse tool can be useful. There are three that you can exploit for the same purpose. Select and hold the third option in the menu on the left to be given a choice. The standard lapse requires hand draw the background; Polygonal Lasso will allow you to draw defined lines, rectilinear; Magnetic Lasso stands at the existing lines and edges. When you have finished drawing around your background, or connect to the starting point to finalize it, or press Ctrl + click. If you use a Tablet running Windows 10, pressing and holding down on the screen you will give you the opportunity to right-click, which opens a context menu with additional functions. Select the one you need, then tap for the same function. If you want a super precise way to select the background of an image, you can use the masking tool. It is the second-hand tool in the left menu. Select, then use a similar brush or tool to paint the selection. This can be combined with the above methods to perfect an existing selection. You should see the You selected appear in red. When you are satisfied with your selection, select the mask tool again to see your selection in dashed lines. If the background is much larger than the first floor when you make a selection with any of the above methods, select the first floor instead, then then CTRL + SHIFT + I to reverse your selection and highlight the background. Now that you have selected the background, it's time to change its color. You can do it in a couple of different ways, depending on the color you want the background to be: u to bring the Hue and Saturation menu. Use the hue cursor to change the tonality of your background. You will keep the same lighting levels as before, but the global color palette will change. If you prefer to have a more uniform color in the background, you can first remove it, then add again before adjusting the tonality. To do this, press CTRL + SHIFT + U to transform the grayscale image, then open the Hue and Saturation menu as before. Select Colorize to add the color back to the background, then use the hue cursor to adjust its color. If you prefer to have a white color as a background, you can simply paint over what you already have. On Windows and MacOS, press F7 to open the layered window. Select New Layer to create a new layer. It is the second icon on the right. Select Fill the tool from the menu to the left. It looks like a paint bucket and is called the tool paint buckle in some versions of Photoshop. Use the color palette at the base of the menu on the left to select the background color, then simply select within the selection to create a white color. If you prefer a gradient effect in your background, select and hold file tool to give you the gradient bucket option, then select and drag within the selection to create a gradient color for your new background.
