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## A rose for emily by william faulkner point of view

in the "A rose for Emily" by William faulkner, the narrator assumes the viewpoint of a participant and observer who is also goal. faulkner emphasizes its purpose: to allow the reader to realize that the community chooses to isolate some members of society. This isolation is caused by the desire of a community to identify and observe members of society who do not understand or find peculiar because of factors such as the economic state. through his exclusive diction, the contrasting, isolated image and the revelation of the inner thoughts and motivations of miss emily, faulkner allows the narrator to portray this purpose. Faulkner's narrator in this short story uses an isolating language to separate Ms. emily from herself and the rest of the community. For example, when he described how the city was vigilely observing the relationship of miss emily and homer barron, the narrator states: "He brought his head high enough - even when we believed it had fallen." (faulkner 30.) the oo of the word we separate citizens from miss emily as if citizens were spectators, looking and criticizing the life of miss emily. Later the narrator expresses: "We were somewhat disappointed that there was no public blowing" (31,) when homer was supposedly missing from the community. Once again the narrator and citizens separate themselves from miss emily in a similar way. They are partly because this report is taboo, to a extent, in that community and citizens do not understand it. the way the narrator narrates from a participatory and observant point of view highlights the idea that the life of miss emily is like an unusual drama that takes place before the eyes of the spectators, the image that the narrator oa exemplifies his role as observer and participant. In addition, the narrator's incarnation of "we" seems to highlight Miss Emily's inability to adapt and function as a Southern woman in a rapidly changing world. According to Alice Robertson, "The Ultimate Voyeur: The Communal Narrator of "A Rose for Emily".... "the addition of more generations among citizens creates "a complete environment that depicts changes in the culture of the post-war South" (159). For example, Miss Emily evades the law when she refuses to have numbers attached to her home when the federal postal service arrived at her residence, revealing her discomfort and discomfort towards change.
